ICONIC IMAGES OF DIANA AND WILLIAM AMONG 'LOST' PICTURES BEING DISPLAYED BY ROYAL PHOTOGRAPHER AT HISTORIC BUCKINGHAMSHIRE GOLF CLUB

he photographer who took the first pictures of Prince William as a baby and has worked with four generations of Royalty, is displaying iconic images thought lost for nearly 30 years at the Buckinghamshire Golf Club in Denham.

The exhibition is open to the local community throughout the county. Ian Pelham-Turner is displaying his work alongside Rhoda Nevins, of the Royal School of Needlework, who helped create the intricate lacework for the Duchess of Cambridge' wedding dress.

The former
Commonwealth-comissioned
photographer's work has appeared
in major magazines across the
world, including Time, Life,
Vogue, Harper's Bazaar, Gold,
Fortune and Hello and his years
alongside the Royal family,
including Diana 'behind the
scenes' has received international
coverage.

He discovered some of the pictures just a couple of weeks before Kate and William's wedding in April when he received a phone call out of the blue. "I got a random phone call and found out that in the region of 100,000 pictures had been discovered in boxes in an old building near the London Wall. It appears that they had been left by former agents of mine. When I opened the first box the images of Diana were the first to come out just days before Prince William's wedding," he said.

As part of the Buckinghamshire




Golf Club exhibition, Ian will also be taking photographs of couples, groups and families in the beautiful setting of the club at the Denham Court mansion, which has a fascinating history with Royal connections. The house once belonged to Queen Eleanor, wife of Edward II and was also the hiding place of Charles II who, story has it, was disguised as a scullion boy to avoid his parliamentary pursuers.

And interestingly, Ian himself is a direct descendant of the Jacobean King.

He added: "It seems fitting we do the exhibition where an ancestor of mine once trod, but as people will see, the house and the stunning grounds are a good enough reason in themselves."

The Buckinghamshire Golf Club is housed at the Denham Court Mansion. It is an historic Grade 11 listed English manor house, mostly built in the eighteenth century, but parts of

The 18-hole golf course and club was established 20 years ago and is owned by Japan's Asahi Breweries Ltd. It is home to the Ladies European Tour, sponsored by Rolex, and also holds daily corporate events.
